All around was a hive of noisy activity with thousands of guillemots, razorbills, kittiwakes and fulmars nesting precariously on the stacks and cliff face. Back down at sea level we took advantage of the sunshine to picnic on the grassy bank overlooking the huge seal colony. Shore birds flitted about searching for invertebrates deposited by the tide, while eider-duck bobbed about in the water just off shore.
